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Make provision about supporting victims of modern slavery.

B E IT ENACTED by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows: —

1 Supporting adult victims of modern slavery

- (1) The Modern Slavery Act 2015 is amended as follows.
- (2) After section 48 insert –

"48A Provision of assistance and support before determination and during reflection and recovery period

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- (1) The Secretary of State must ensure that a person to whom this section applies is provided with assistance and support in accordance with this section unless section 52B applies.
- (2) This section applies to a person if
 - (a) that person is aged 18 or over or, in the case where the age of the person is uncertain, the person does not fall within the provisions of section 51 (presumption about age); and

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(b) either a referral relating to that person has been made to the competent authority, for a determination as to whether the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking, or the Secretary of State knows that such a referral will be made in the next three days.

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- (3) Subject to subsection (4), assistance and support must be provided under this section until in relation to that person—
 - (a) a determination is made that there are not reasonable grounds to believe that the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking; or

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- (b) a conclusive determination is made that the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking; or
- (c) a conclusive determination is made that the person is not a victim of slavery or human trafficking and all processes for

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reconsideration of such a determination, including internal reviews and appeals to an independent tribunal or court of law, have been completed.

- have been completed. (4) If a conclusive determination that a person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking is made within the reflection and recovery period, 5 assistance and support is to be provided until the end of that period. The reflection and recovery period is the period of 45 days following the day on which a determination is made by the competent authority that there are reasonable grounds to believe that the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking. 10 Where assistance and support has been provided to a person under this section the Secretary of State may secure continued provision of that assistance and support for no more than nine days if a determination is made that there are not conclusive grounds to believe that the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking. 15 The Secretary of State must ensure that a person to whom this section applies is granted immigration bail under Schedule 10 to the Immigration Act 2016 where necessary for the period in which they are entitled to support under this section. Provision of assistance and support to adult victims of modern slavery 20 following conclusive determination by a competent authority The Secretary of State must ensure that a person to whom this section applies is provided with assistance and support in accordance with this section unless section 52B applies. This section applies to a person if – 25 that person is aged 18 or over or, or in the case where the age of the person is uncertain, the person does not fall within the provisions of section 51 (presumption about age); and (b) a competent authority has made a conclusive determination that the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking. 30 Assistance and support must be provided for at least 12 months from the day on which support provided under section 48A ends. Where assistance and support is provided to a person under this section the Secretary of State must consider whether it is necessary for the victim's physical, psychological and social recovery to provide 35 assistance and support after the end of the period in subsection (3) for as long as they think appropriate subject to subsection (6). A decision whether to provide assistance and support in accordance with subsection (4) must be made at least four weeks before the end of 40 the assistance and supported provided under subsection (3).
- (6) In determining
 - (a) whether it is necessary to provide assistance and support under subsection (4), and
 - (b) the period of time for which such assistance and support is to be provided,

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the Secretary of State must have regard to the factors set out in subsection (7).

	(d)	must be provided to meet the needs of that person having particular regard to any special needs or vulnerabilities of that person caused by gender, pregnancy, physical or mental illness, disability or being the victim of violence or abuse;
	(e)	must be provided in accordance with an assistance and support plan which specifies that person's needs for support and how those needs will be met for the full duration of the period to which that person is entitled to support under this Act.

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- (1) The Modern Slavery Act 2015 is amended as follows.
- (2) After section 52 insert –

"52A Provision of leave to remain following conclusive determination

Immigration rules must make provision for leave to remain in the United Kingdom to be granted to a person where there has been a

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conclusive determination that a person is a victim of slavery or hu	man
trafficking if and only if either subsection (2) or (3) applies and se-	ction
52B does not.	

(2) This subsection applies if the person receives support and assistance under one of the following –

(a) section 48B;

- (b) section 18(9) of the Human Trafficking and Exploitation (Criminal Justice and Support for Victims) Act (Northern Ireland) 2015 (c. 2 (N.I.));
- (c) section 9(3)(c) of the Human Trafficking and Exploitation (Scotland) Act 2015 (asp 12); or
- (d) regulation 3(4)(c) of the Human Trafficking and Exploitation (Scotland) Act 2015 (Support for Victims) Regulations 2018 (S.S.I 2018/90).
- (3) This subsection applies if the person meets one or more of the following criteria
 - (a) leave is necessary due to the person's circumstances, including but not restricted to
 - (i) the needs of that person for safety and protection from harm including protection from re-trafficking;
 - (ii) the needs of that person for medical and psychological treatment;
 - (b) the person is participating as a witness in criminal proceedings;
 - (c) the person is bringing any civil proceedings including pursuing compensation.
- (4) Where the person is receiving assistance from a support worker the recommendations of the support worker must be considered in assessing that person's circumstances under subsection (3)(a).
- (5) Immigration rules must provide for persons granted leave to remain in accordance with this section to have recourse to public funds for the duration of the period of leave.
- (6) Immigration rules must provide for leave to remain to be granted from the day on which the conclusive determination is communicated to a person for either
 - (a) the amount of time support and assistance will be provided under one of the measures listed in subsection (2); or
 - (b) at least 12 months if the person meets one or more of the criteria in subsection (3).
- (7) Immigration rules must allow a grant of leave to remain under subsection (6) to be extended subject to the requirements of subsection (8).
- (8) In determining whether to extend a grant of leave to remain under subsection (7), and the period of time for which such extended leave should be provided, the person's individual circumstances must be considered, and whether that person—
 - (a) is receiving on-going support and assistance under the measures set out in subsection (2); or
 - (b) meets one or more of the criteria in subsection (3).

5 "Immigration rules" in this section has the meaning given by section 33 of the Immigration Act 1971. 52B Refusal of assistance and support, immigration bail or leave to remain This section applies to sections 48A and 48B insofar as they apply to 5 England and Wales. This section also applies to section 52A insofar as it applies to England and Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. A person may be refused immigration bail, assistance and support or leave to remain, as appropriate, if – the person is a sexual or violent offender; and 10 the Secretary of State considers that the person poses a genuine, present and serious risk to members of the public. If subsection (2) applies, the Secretary State shall ensure the person affected is given reasons for the refusal in writing. In this section, "sexual or violent offender" means a person falling 15 within the definition of a "sexual or violent offender" in section 327 of the Criminal Justice Act 2003 (section 325: interpretation) or who has been convicted of an offence under the law of another country which would have constituted an offence falling within those subsections if it 20 had been done in England and Wales." After section 52B insert – "52C Data reporting 25 The Secretary of State must lay an annual report before both Houses of Parliament showing, for the previous financial year the number of notifications to the Secretary of State under section 52 and the number of individuals of each nationality recorded in the notifications; the immigration status and nationality of all persons where a 30 referral has been made to the competent authority for a determination as to whether the person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking, which includes the following – the number of persons where there has been a conclusive determination, or reasonable grounds to 35 suspect, that a person is a victim of slavery or human trafficking; the number of persons who have been detained and the status of their referral to the competent authority; the number of persons subject to enforced return and the 40 status of their referral to the competent authority;
